## **Marlboro Community Store Sprouts Wings!**



With Sweetie's closed, people in the community have come together to re-vision a new life for the space, one that addresses our community's needs for basic groceries, gas, and a community gathering space. The first large public meeting was held in November in the Elementary School Outback, where representatives from the Preservation Trust of Vermont and several community stores shared their experience and know-how. Around 100 members

from the Marlboro community showed up to speak about their ideas, sign on to help in various ways, and join one of two working committees. These committees met for a brainstorming session two weeks later, at which point the group unanimously agreed that some type of cooperatively owned or run business is the best model for the space and for our community (this would be owned by community members—you!—and not the legal entity of the Town of Marlboro).

Joyce St. Jean, the owner of the space, has generously offered to take the property off the market for a small amount of cash while an appraisal of the property is completed. The Finance committee is working on raising this capital, as well as operating funds for at least the first year. The building is currently being appraised by a commercial appraiser, and the committee met with an independent fundraising consultant so that the group may be effective going forward. The Vision/Ideas committee is currently defining what will work best for our community in the space, taking into account data from the surveys done in late October. All agree that a grocery store/gas station is essential, one that carries a broad range of products that will serve every member of the community. With so many talented craftspeople, artists, gardeners, and farmers (the list goes on) here, the group would also like to have space in which people can showcase their wares. In addition, members are exploring ways that part of the building might also serve as a multi-purpose community gathering space. Members from both groups are taking field trips to other similar stores around the state and in neighboring states to inform the decision making process.

Members of both committees have rolled up their sleeves and are actively engaged in getting this essential resource up and running for our community. The group will be kicking off a capital campaign early in the new year, with the Marlboro Alliance acting as our non-profit umbrella for the Marlboro Community Store Working Group. There will be another combined Finance/Vision meeting the first week of January (time and day TBD). If you would like to be a part of this (the more community members involved, the better!) or any other meeting, please contact Ani Schaeffer at [abra.ani@gmail.com](mailto:abra.ani@gmail.com), and you will be added to the group. With all of us working together, we'll have our store up and running again soon, in service to our community!

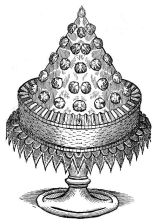

## From the Marlboro Elementary School Board

## Wide Corner on Augur Hole...Please Drive Slow!

On November 29<sup>th</sup>, Peggy Tiffany, on behalf of numerous residents and regular users of the Augur Hole Road, brought the topic of concern of the safety of the wide corner on that road to the Select Board. An in depth conversation followed that included the Select Board, Peggy and David Elliot, Road Crew Chief.

The initial proposal was that guardrails be installed on the corner. As the foliage that once bordered the road was washed out during Tropical Storm Irene flooding, the perception of vulnerability is heightened. Concerns of users of the road are that the perception that the road drops off more dramatically than in the past is real, people and in particular logging trucks are traveling more closely to the center of the road and thus the potential of forcing other drivers off the road and over the bank has been heightened.

Discussion followed that included information that the grade of the banks is in compliance with regulation and as such do not require guardrails. Also discussed was the high cost of guardrails and the related financial stress on the town, the less than ideal value of guardrails in the case of an accident and the potential damage to cars from guardrails when hit.

Alternatives that might offer better definition to the sides of the road and, as a result, help vehicles stay on their own sides of the road were discussed as well and will continue to be considered. Such ideas included planting trees and other vegetation. It was in fact noted that the perception of safety pre-Irene was likely a result of existing vegetation that softened the appearance of the landscape.

As the time of year is less than ideal for a road site visit it was agreed that a road walk should be scheduled for the spring. All interested parties will be invited to participate. In the meantime, the Select Board suggests that all residents drive with caution and be considerate of others. And we appreciate all your ideas, thoughts and participation.

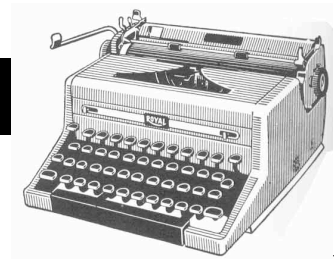

## The Select Board Report by Marcia Hamilton

The select board meets every second and fourth Thursday at the Town Office, unless otherwise warned. Winter hours are in effect through March and the board meets at 4:30 PM.

Marlboro residents responded to the call to serve the Town, and the board made the following appointments:

**Bennett Grout** to the Planning Commission, 4-year Member term, vacancy, to expire 2014;

**Gail MacArthur** to the Development Review Board, 1-year Alternate term, vacancy, to expire 2013;

**Julia von Ranson** to the Development Review Board, 4-year Member term, vacancy, to expire 2014

Adams Brook Road has been under construction with the help of a FEMA Hazard Mitigation Grant, and the project has been completed. Approximately 3,168 feet of the road was moved approximately 100 yards to the northeast where it runs on property currently owned by Anthony and Carol Berner. The proposed road comprises approximately 3.64 acres of land. The board Accepted the new section, Discontinued part of the old section and will keep 860 feet of the old section with culverts to protect the new section. This part will be called Adams Brook Lane.

**Craig Hammond** announced that he will be retiring from his position on the select board, after serving for six years. His term ends on Town Meeting Day, Tuesday, March 5, 2013. He wants to pass on to all residents that it is a wonderful and rewarding way to serve the town, and he hopes that others will now step up and run for the open position, to be elected on March 5th. Anyone interested must obtain election paperwork from the Town Clerk and submit a petition, due January 28, 2013.

The board set February 26, 2013 as Pre Town Meeting day. It is an opportunity to meet the candidates and see a preview of the budget.
