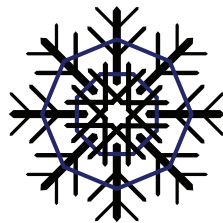

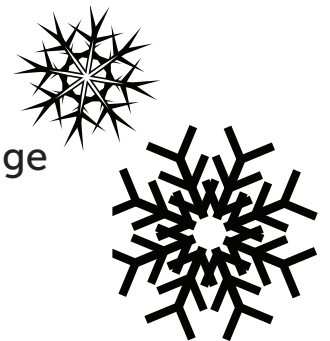

Gorgeous fall weather has helped us get off to a great start to the school year at Marlboro School. Returning students welcome new students who, in turn, bring an infusion of fresh energy to our school community.

Here's a snapshot from each class.

Ellen's kindergartners hosted an Insect Celebration for parents and 3rd-4th grade Reading Buddies. They shared a book they had written, songs, and poems about the insects they had been studying. In addition parent volunteers, Gabe Hulme and Aaron Walsh, met with Ellen to plan for the construction of a shelter in the woods for Forest Kindergarten.

Judy's Primary class is studying birds and has been observing them to determine the one characteristic that no other animal has. Can you guess what it is? They visited the Hogback Museum to see stuffed birds up close. They are also reading books by Leo Lionni and using his stories to inspire their own writing.

Erica's 3rd/4th grade visited the Food Connects Farm and, among other things, learned about the bee hive. The students had so many questions about these fascinating

He misplaced his keys frequently and was terrible at keeping track of which violin had been assigned to which student. And he was wonderful.

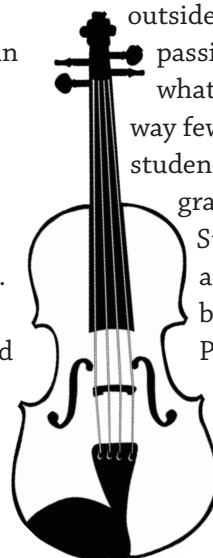
insects that they are extending it into a class research project. What a great way to learn about non-fiction text and to learn how to search for information.

Before the trip students were immersed in studying topics such as salt marshes, lighthouses, and whaling. While on the trip they were able to have first hand experiences which resulted in comments such as, "So that's what they mean by 'high tide'!"

Rachel and Tim's Junior High took off running with an ice cream booth at the Marlboro Fair and the Cider Sale. They will also be offering Rent a Kid services. All of this focus on fundraising is essential as they begin another two year cycle of Field Research with a week in Washington, DC next spring and Costa Rica the spring of 2017.

So you can see we've been busy. Sadly our happy beginning to the school year was brought to an abrupt end on October 12 by the death of beloved strings teacher, David Tasgal, in a bicycling accident. I've included a tribute to David separately.

Sometimes David came to me with concerns about a student — maybe s/he was misbehaving or not practicing enough or needed to switch groups or was so advanced that he wanted the student to have individual instruction outside of school. He cared deeply and was absolutely passionate about supporting each player in whatever way s/he needed. He "got" kids in a way few of us do. He was elated as the number of students who kept with the violin into the older grades grew. Advanced ensembles were formed. Student bands played contra dances at Sing and the string students collaborated with band students to form an orchestra and play Pachelbel Canon in D. It was remarkable!



David's death leaves a huge void. We are filled with sadness. We are all cherishing the many memories we have which will keep David alive in our hearts.

Who are Marlboro's Non-profits? What do they do?

As the end of the year approaches, appeals for charitable giving start appearing in our mailboxes. I am President of a local non-profit, the Marlboro School Association, and in response to questions received last year, would like to share some clarifying information about the different missions of three Marlboro organizations that support local educational needs and rely on the generosity of residents.

1) **The Marlboro School Association** (MSA) was formed in 1994 to support the Marlboro Elementary School (MES) on a long-term basis. We decided to create an organization that would raise funds for, and manage, an endowment for MES. Income from the endowment would be used to provide funds for projects and programs at MES. Each year, proceeds from the annual MSA appeal are added to the ever-growing endowment. Each year, the MSA distributes endowment income "to enrich the Marlboro Elementary School students' education beyond that which can fairly and reasonably be raised through local taxes." Only income is distributed, the endowment remains untouched. So any donations made to the MSA increase the endowment, and benefit all future students at the school, not just those who attend the year donations are made.

Some examples of the many projects MSA has supported over the last 20+ years include: funds for P.E. equipment, school internet access, support for special class trips, playground upgrades, the climbing wall, multiple technology improvements, Outback sound systems, reference books, shelving for the library, soundproofing of various classrooms, and several music programs. 2) **The Marlboro Parents & Friends** (P&F) has been in existence for decades. It is an informal association of current parents and any friends who would like to support the school in its day-to-day activities.

P&F sponsors fundraisers to raise money for teacher, classroom and program short-term or immediate requests that are beyond the means of the regular budget. P&F also sponsors family events and typically starts off the school

year by hosting the back to school potluck.

Room Parents are another active part of P&F and their primary function is to communicate with the teacher to help coordinate various classroom events and projects. For more information about the P&F, please contact Gretchen Webber webber.gretchen@gmail.com.

As you can see, MSA supports major school-wide projects, programs, and needs at MES, funding projects with long-term benefits or that would not be possible without MSA's financial support, while P&F concentrates on smaller, immediate needs, including financing and programs for parents and the school community. Together, these two school organizations provide complementary support to our school.

3) Finally the **Marlboro Alliance** (MA) is a non-profit umbrella organization for multiple local programs. For a complete description of everything MA does, see Michelle Holzapfel's article elsewhere in this issue of The Mixer.

Here I'll just mention two ways that MA contributes to education in our town. The first is the MA Scholarship Fund, for which there is an annual fall appeal. This fund provides grants to Marlboro K - 12 students to attend summer camp programs, and to older local students for higher education. In addition, MA occasionally provides some funding for a program or need at MES.

The aim of this article has been to help Marlboro residents understand the complementary roles of these three local non-profits. All Marlboro non-profits, including those not mentioned in this article that support other town needs, make important contributions to our community, and I hope you will continue supporting them with your donations and time in the future.

From Marlboro Alliance

As the year winds down, several community organizations ask for your support. One of these, the Marlboro Alliance, is an all-volunteer 501(c)3 charitable corporation. Our non-profit umbrella shelters Marlboro Cares, the Marlboro Fair and the Marlboro Mixer. Our Community Events committee, Family Crisis Fund and Scholarship Fund continue the legacy of our predecessor, the Community Club.

The Marlboro Alliance Scholarship Fund is an independent effort which supports our town's students. Our fall appeal provides scholarships which help our town's students meet the costs of summer programs and expenses for higher education. We disburse the majority of the funds we raise each year.

Last year's appeal brought in \$3360 which helped ten elementary students and six high school students to attend summer programs. Grants of \$400 were given to six college-bound students. Our grants totaled \$4480. And thanks to our first-ever benefit concert we have a modest buffer against the ups and downs of future giving.

We depend on you, our community, to support the 2015-16 Scholarship Fund appeal. If you've been meaning to give, please make this the year that you do. Every dollar helps. Is there any better investment than the education of our community's students?

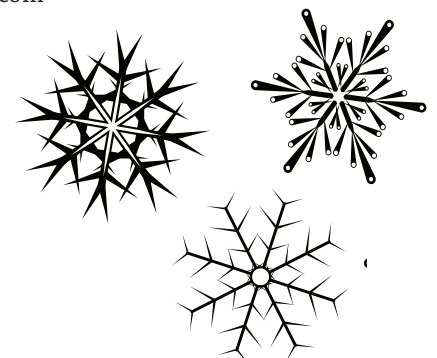
