

South Pond 2016

Clean-up day is Sunday May 29th, 10am- noon (Rain or shine)

Attending both the May and September clean-up days entitles you to a "working membership." (Coffee, juice and donuts will be provided. Please bring baked goods for a potluck breakfast!)

Clean-up day tasks this year include:

- Cleaning up the road and parking lot
- Splitting and stacking wood from felled trees
- Putting out the docks, taking apart the old dock
- Mowing grass
- Sweeping and cleaning the bathhouses
- Setting up swings and tetherball
- Raking beaches

Please bring boots and gloves. Especially needed are: mowers, battery operated drill and saws, rakes, shovels, wheelbarrows, and trucks to haul wood.

Annual Meeting will take place among members present after clean-up.

Membership Requirements: All members must be year-round residents of Marlboro. At least one person in the household must be a registered voter in the town of Marlboro

Summer Program: Poetry, Bookmaking and Art Workshop

Once again a summer workshop combining poetry, bookmaking and art, will be held at Ann Gengarely's Poetry Studio. As always, young people will have the opportunity to write and draw in a natural setting with woodlands and beautiful gardens.

Workshops are divided into two groups; a younger group and another one focused on Junior High and High School students. Each student participates in a poetry and bookmaking/art class each day.

Classes are kept small in order to create an individualized and intimate setting where creativity flourishes.

Family membership: More than one person in a household using the pond. This includes: adult(s) and child(ren) living together. This can include adult children living at home but does not include those who now live elsewhere. Adult children living elsewhere may be the guest of a member but must be accompanied by the member.

Individual membership: A single person using the pond. The individual must be a registered voter in the town

Stickers can be purchased at clean-up day or by mail.
Be sure to bring your checkbook to cleanup day! Only full price (non-working) memberships will be available after clean-up day. To pay by mail please send full payment to Marlboro Park Association, PO Box 470, Marlboro, VT 05344. Please be sure to include your phone number in your mailing. Your payment must be received no later than July 1, 2016.

Fees are the same as last year:

\$84 for families, \$48 for working families (adult children must live with you)
\$48 for individual, \$24 for working individual
Working members must attend both May and September clean-up days.

Poetry classes will be taught by Ann Gengarely who has been a poet-in –the-schools for over twenty-five years. Bookmaking and Art Design will be led by Tony Gengarely who teaches Art History at Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts.

The Select Board meets at 5:00 PM every second and fourth Thursday at the Town Office, unless otherwise warned.

The Select Board reorganized at the March 10 meeting and voted Tyler Gibbons, Chair and Pieter van Loon, Vice Chair. Andy Reichsman did not seek reelection and Patti Smith was elected to the Board.

The Board adopted Select Board Rules of Procedure and a Conflict of Interest Policy designated the Brattleboro Reformer as the Official Newspaper for Publication of Notices designated the Town Website marlborovt.us as the Official Town Website authorized Select Board members to individually approve and sign Pay Orders when the biweekly pay date falls during the first and third Thursdays of the month, and the Select Board meetings fall on the second and fourth Thursdays.

Town Official appointments were made, as shown on the table on the next page.


All of these people donate a tremendous amount of time and effort for the benefit of the town and the select board would like to thank them for their generosity. Three of the vacancies to be filled are: Energy Coordinator, Rescue Inc. Representative and Senior Solutions Advisory Board Representative. Descriptions can be found under the Municipal Directory on the Town Website marlborovt.us. The Board had discussions with Adam Gebb, Chair of the Conservation Commission, about invasive species and a proposed plant removal project. Adam recommends a small patch be tested first. He would recommend the proposal be redone and incorporate recommendations made by the Conservation Commission. The new proposal will be submitted to the select Board before any action is taken.

The Board continued to have discussions about connectivity and invited interested people to a select board meeting to facilitate the forming of the committee. The committee will periodically update the select board on activities.

The Board accepted the bid of Springfield Paving to pave South Road this summer. A State grant will pay for 80% of the cost.

Discussions have occurred again about working with the State to reduce the speed limit near Marlboro School. Discussions involved the select board, school officials, State officials and concerned citizens.

Tick Spray Recipe

Below is an all natural and very effective recipe for a spray that keeps ticks, mosquitoes and black flies from liking you. It comes from a gardener in Westport, MA., one of the epicenters of deer ticks. She's been using it for 3 years, without finding a single tick on her (compared to 18/day previously). I used it happily all last year and never saw a tick.

Tick Spray

Into 8 oz of water put 10 drops each of the following essential oils:

- Cedarwood
- Cirtonella
- Eucalyptus
- Lemongrass
- Sweet Orange
- Rosemary



Pour into a spray bottle
To use: Shake vigorously
and often.

Springtime at Marlboro School! Here's a snapshot

The mottled leaves of the trout lily are poking through the leaf duff in the woods where **the Kindergartners** spend their afternoons. The students pay attention to every change as they dig into the dirt, move logs, and sweep the dirt clean of leaves.

At All School Sing **the Primary** presented what they've been observing learning about solids and liquids. They performed experiments, collected data, and drew conclusions about what was happening.

The 3rd-4th grade is readying the garden for planting. They've started plants under the grow lights and are observing how different fertilizers support their growth. The vegetables they set out in the garden will mature over the summer and feed us next fall.

In **the 5th-6th grade** independent study projects about astronomy are taking the students into the depths of outer space.

The Junior High is preparing for their field research trip to Washington, D.C. While there they will tour the Capitol (thank you, Senator Leahy!), work in the food warehouse for citywide soup kitchens, visit the Holocaust Museum and many of the Smithsonian museums, and take in a show at the Kennedy Center. As part of their study of government they've chosen a topic to learn about in depth and then find a way to lobby and express their views. This year's topic is the rights of transgender people.

On May 4th **the entire school** will participate in National Walk/Bike to School Day – with a twist! We will use this event to call attention to the traffic safety concerns on Route 9 at the school entrance and exit. Look for us at 11:30 as we walk along Route 9 to South Road and on to the Post Office! We'll be accompanied by a sheriff's vehicle for safety – and we invite you to join us.

As always, I invite you to stop by for a visit. All School Sing is on Wednesday mornings at 8:30 and we'd love to have you join us.

MES Receives CLiF Grant

Children's Literacy Foundation (CLiF) Awards Marlboro Elementary School \$25,000 Grant for Literacy Programs, Support, and New Books!!


Next school year is going to be a very exciting year here in Marlboro -- every month there will be book related events like book give-aways, author visits, library programs, food (!!) and more...In addition, we will be providing open library hours during the summer. This grant is \$25,000 in literacy programs, events, support, professional development, and new books to each school over the course of one school year. Four New Hampshire and five Vermont elementary schools received the grant for the 2016- 2017 school year.

The grant provides new books for towns, schools, and classroom libraries; workshops by professional authors, storytellers, and illustrators; field trips, minigrants for teachers' classroom projects; parent literacy seminars; and new books for students to choose and keep for their home libraries!
