The newly formed Marlboro Community Center and Library, part of the Marlboro Alliance, will be opening soon on the first floor of the Marlboro Meeting House. We'll kick off with an Election Day Open House. Tuesday, November 6th from 4 to 7 pm.

It's been a very busy summer getting things ready for our grand opening! The space has received a bright new coat of paint. The bathroom has been updated to include a handicap accessible toilet and hand rails. Some electrical upgrades have happened, including new switches in the bathroom and several new outlets in the main room. The back storage room has been transformed into a new library and shared office for the Marlboro Alliance, also freshly painted and getting new outlets. Some furnishings have been purchased or generously donated, for both spaces and we are ready to open our doors!

We are also excited to announce we have hired **Gemma Ollis** as our new Coordinator. Gemma lives in Marlboro with her husband and daughter. She knows the Marlboro Meeting House well, having worked at the Meeting House School, and bringing her daughter to play group, there. Gemma says, "Playgroup was a



place where we could go knowing it would be warm, close to home, and filled with our new friends." Now she hopes to give that feeling of belonging to our town through our new Community Center, which will include a library, a cafe and cozy space for reading and relaxing. High speed internet will allow for working remotely to those who might find that useful. It will be a venue for events, senior lunches organized by Marlboro Cares, yoga, art classes, film nights, and many other exciting programs.

Marlboro School Fall Highlights

Association of Marlboro Parents (AMP) will be finishing their Social Justice Initiative this month. Stay tuned for activities and events that will ensue from this meaningful work. In addition, this year's AMP meetings will focus on supporting preschool and holding theme-based discussions. Some of these discussions will include our sports programs, food program and Agency of Education initiatives.

We are taking considerable steps towards improving the safety of our school. Some of these steps include cell phone boosters, an announcement system and keyless exterior locks, which have been subsidized by \$20,000 in grants. The former recycling lot has been improved and is now where students are dropped off and picked up by the

busses. In addition, the WCSU has spent this past year standardizing our emergency protocols with support from school safety consultants.

Field research continues to be an important component to our programming. Some examples from this year include: Brattleboro Museum, Camping at Mt. Mansfield, Black Mountain Day, Green Mountain Orchards, and Literary Festival event at Latchis Theater.

Late Fall on Hogback - Getting Ready for Winter

Friday, Nov 23, 1:00-4:00

Ski Slope Clean-Up Day

By now it's a tradition among those who like to clamber around the former Hogback Ski Area on skis and snowshoes during the winter. Spend the Friday afternoon after Thanksgiving on the mountain with us, clearing away blowdowns, cutting back brambles, trimming face slapping branches. We do just enough touching up to keep a ski-able line or two open on the old ski runs. "Earn Your Turns" is the motto of the human-powered ski movement (no lifts here!), and it applies to the necessary fall cleanup work as well as to climbing the mountain in order to ski down it. But please, don't go up there on your own to "help" by clearing. The work we do is carefully planned and meshes with other programs on the mountain, such as the wildlife habitat improvement project. Come help us on this special ski-focused work day.

We can use all levels of help, from chain sawyers to folks with brush cutters to people armed with loppers to able bodies to haul brush. Bring your own favorite tool or borrow one from our stash. Note that if you want to use a chainsaw or a brush cutter on Hogback, you must wear a full set of safety gear, including chaps, helmet, face/eye and hearing protection. If you don't have a set of your own we can loan you one. Meet in the parking lot on the south side of Route 9 between the gift shop and the white distillery building at 1:00.

Monday, December 31, 3:30-5:30

Last Sunset of the Year

Join us for a fun late afternoon trek to the fire tower to watch the last sunset of the year. You won't see the actual sunset unless you climb the fire tower to get above the trees, but if you do, what a view! Not only the sun dipping below the far hills to the west, but the glowing effect on the rolling forests to the north, south, and east. This summer Molly Stark State Park replaced the wooden steps on the fire tower with metal grating steps. That will make the climb much less slippery if there's snow. Thanks, Molly Stark!

If there's snow on the ground, this will be a snowshoe hike. Ski poles can come in handy because the well-loved Tower Trail can get icy from heavy use. No snow? We'll have a pleasant hike. Don't be late, because the sun won't wait! Meet at 3:30 in the parking lot near the white distillery building, on the south side of Route 9 just west of the gift shop. Are you borrowing snowshoes? Practice putting them on at home before you come, so that we don't have to linger in that windy parking lot figuring out how to adjust unfamiliar bindings as the sun slips lower and lower. Bring a flashlight for the return trip. We typically get back to the parking lot while there's still enough light from the long, lingering winter twilight to easily see our steps, but it's good to have a light source for unexpected situations.

Two SeVEDS Representatives visited the Select Board in late August and gave updates on new SeVEDS initiatives such as the following: an internship program, a new microentrepreneur loan fund, the Connectivity Summit, Comprehensive Economic Development Strategies, and a southern Vermont marketing campaign to encourage people to move here to fill jobs. They are working closely with Marlboro College. They also spoke extensively about their work around connectivity within southern VT.

Public Wifi Improvements

We are pleased to spread the word about two new and improved public wifi options in the center of town!

1. The public wifi connection at the Marlboro Town Office has been significantly upgraded. We now offer a 10 Mbps download and 5 Mbps upload connection speed in front of and within the office. This free internet access point is provided by the town to anyone who needs a bit of faster 'net from time to time. (Note: a few specific streaming sites such as Netflix are throttled down, so using the town office specifically for streaming will be impractical). Special thanks to Forrest and the Town Office staff of helping to facilitate this improvement!

2. The Marlboro Community Center is now offering free

Recycling Update

Dear Townsfolk,

Many of you have been wondering how our community has been doing with our new recycling set up. I am pleased to report that, according to our hauler TAM, we are doing very well indeed! Since the beginning of the year, we have recycled 23.4 tons of co-mingle containers, and 28.1 tons of mixed paper. As such, we have both helped recycle lots of material and are on course to stay within our budget of \$7500 for the year.

Better yet, TAM reports that “Marlboro does an excellent job of making sure the correct materials are being recycled.” A sample co-mingle container that they checked for us yielded greater than 90% proper recyclable materials (90% is the goal). With the exception of some plastic bags mixed in, they said the contents were exactly what they are looking for from a co-mingle bin.

So, first, let me congratulate you all for doing a super job! Also, let me sincerely thank, once again, David Elliott and the road crew for helping to manage and maintain the bins and for communicating with TAM!

Okay, feeling good? Now for some notes and reminders:

1. Junior High bottle redemption change: The junior high class is closing the Redemption Center in the school's lower parking lot. If people would like to continue to donate to the junior high's field research trips with their returnables, it would be greatly appreciated, and they can be left in the junior high's name at two redemption centers: 1) Putney Road Redemption Center, 693 Putney Rd 2) Discount Beverage & Redemption, 157 Marlboro Rd, West Brattleboro. Please do not leave returnables outside the containers at our Recycling Center. Bring them to a redemption center or add them to the regular recycling in the co-mingle container.

2. Break down cardboard boxes: Please remember to break your cardboard boxes down! Each flattened box saves the town money and is a joy to behold, like a beautiful, square paper pancake. If you notice boxes in the bin that are not broken down, help a town out and take a moment to break a few down!

3. Plastic Bags: not cool or groovy. Please, please, please do not put plastic bags into either the co-mingle containers or the mixed paper bin. Plastic bags can be recycled at the Brattleboro Food Coop or should be disposed of elsewhere. If you have bundled your recyclables in a plastic bag, empty the contents and take the plastic bag away with you.

4. Trash: thanks but no thanks. As always, please be reminded that the recycling center is in no way a dump site; trash should never be left in the containers or anywhere around the site. We all own this site and are responsible for its success; thanks for your thoughtful consideration here!

5. Road crew in charge: David is the sole communication point between the town and TAM. He determines when the bins are full and contacts TAM at the right time for haulage. Please do not contact TAM yourself or other town officials if you think the bins are full. If the bins are still at the site, there's more room in them! You can find it!

6. Back to warm and fuzzy: Thank you all again for your expert use of the Marlboro Recycling Center. Terrific job! Here's to another year of productive recycling!



Paws for Thought

Prepare Your Pets for Winter

In many areas, winter is a season of bitter cold and numbing wetness. Make sure your four-footed family members stay safe and warm by following these simple guidelines from the Humane Society of the United States:

- Keep pets sheltered
- Bundle up and wipe down
- Remove common poisons

Keep pets sheltered

• Keep your pets inside with you and your family. Under no circumstances should pet cats be left outdoors, even if they roam outside during other seasons. Dogs are happiest when taken out frequently for walks and exercise, but kept inside the rest of the time. Don't leave pets outdoors when the temperature drops.

• If your dog is outdoors much of the day for any reason, they must be protected by a dry, draft-free shelter that is large enough to allow them to move comfortably, but small enough to hold in body heat. The floor should be raised a few inches from the ground and covered with cedar shavings or straw. The doorway should be covered with waterproof burlap or heavy plastic.

• Routinely check your pet's water dish to make certain the water is fresh and unfrozen. Use plastic food and water bowls; when the temperature is low, your pet's tongue can stick and freeze to metal.

Bundle up, wipe down

• No matter what the temperature is, windchill can threaten a pet's life. Exposed skin on noses, ears and paw pads are at risk for frostbite and hypothermia during extreme cold snaps. For this reason, short-haired dogs often feel more comfortable wearing a sweater — even during short walks.

• Rock salt and other chemicals used to melt snow and ice can irritate the pads of your pet's feet. Wipe all paws with a damp towel before your pet licks them and irritates their mouth.

Remove common poisons

• Antifreeze is a deadly poison, but it has a sweet taste that may attract animals and children. Wipe up any antifreeze spills immediately and keep it, like all household chemicals, out of reach. Coolants and antifreeze made with propylene glycol are less toxic to pets, wildlife and family.

• Dogs are at particular risk of salt poisoning in winter due to the rock salt used in many areas — often when licking it from their paws after a walk. Store de-icing salt in a safe place and wipe your dog's paws, even after short walks. If your dog ingests rock salt, call a veterinarian immediately.
